

In *Reading Magic: Why Reading Aloud to Our Children Will Change Their Lives Forever*, bestselling picture book author Mem Fox extols the benefits of reading to preschoolers even newborns and gives suggestions for helping children learn to read by themselves. learners, discusses the importance of books in the home, and stresses the value of a read-aloud ritual. She also includes a chapter on how to read aloud, which novice readers will find useful. Anecdotal stories are widespread, and "success stories" might intimidate parents whose children do not learn to read by age five, even with mom or dad reading aloud to them. Theories provided do not include reference to supporting research. In the chapter "Birth, Brains, and Beyond," Fox writes that "having deep-and-meaningful conversations with our kids.-[has] also been linked positively to IQ development" without reference to her source for this information. Proponents of phonics-based reading instruction will take issue with the author's "whole stories" approach. There are no age-appropriate reading lists for busy parents, and there is no bibliography for the works cited in the text. Libraries that already own Jim Trelease's *The Read-Aloud Handbook* (Penguin, 1995) or Bernice E. Cullinan's *Read to Me: Raising Kids Who Love to Read* (Scholastic, 1992) will find this new title an additional purchase. Shauna Yusko, King County Library System, Bellevue, WA

Without wanting to play 'baby olympics' because she's is certainly no child prodigy and this book isn't about getting ahead at all I highly recommend it. There was a marked difference in my daughters speech development, attention span, ability to read at a very you age, than her peers who had not been read aloud too as much. For me .. Reading aloud from a very young age gave her these skills and I think it's fundamental in child development. If everyone read aloud to their kids from as early as possible, as much as possible the world would have a much higher literacy rate (in my humble opinion).

This is my first review - after years of being a customer, because this book warrants it. My precocious 4 year old is at this stage where he knows all the letters and has memorized a bunch of his favorite books, and I was feeling like I should help him with his reading skills by teaching him.... phonics? sight words/whole words? I was reading reviews on and came upon this gem. After reading it, I'm convinced that I should just continue (with more frequency and fun) what I've been doing anyway up to this point, which is read to him! I liked the book enough to purchase two of the recommended books at the end, *Brown Bear Brown Bear What Do You See*, and Mem's own good night book, *Time for Bed*. These were birthday gifts for my two year old daughter, and by the end of the week, she could "read" too! Something about these books is truly magical - the words, the rhythm and emotion, the pictures... everything! She insists on reading these two aloud every night.

And she can read along and say so many of the words, words that I didn't even know that she knew! This experience reinforced to me Mem's theory that reading trumps phonics and whole word methods any day. You'd think it was obvious that if you wanted to teach a child to read, that you would simply read to them but these days there are so many conflicting theories that it's hard to know for sure. All I know is that my children love being read to, they love the books Mem recommends (my 4 year old always comes over to hear these books too!), and I'm confident that the fun of reading will be what tips my kid into reading on his own. Mem also recommends some fun games in the books that you can play while reading that helps them along to recognize letters, sounds, etc.

Reading Magic is a quick and easily read resource to new parents and educators to help introduce them into the world of literacy. Mem explains how reading is crucial in the development of children even as early as 4 months old. As a nanny of two 7 year olds, a 3 year old, and a 6 month old, I can attest to how important it is to read aloud to children of all ages and stages. The strategies and tools Mem talks about helps encourage and motivate children to read on their own. Having said that, as an educator, Mem would benefit from siting more scientific sources to back up her opinions. She has great ideas for introducing reading to children, but some what neglects other helpful/necessary/scientifically proven data-- such as phonics and phonemic awareness. Reading aloud is very powerful but it is not the sole indicator for success in reading, there needs to be a balance between the love and desire for reading with the skills and tools each child needs for comprehension and success. This is a great book to help parents and educators to re-motivate themselves as well as a good introductory, but I'd also make sure to research other proven methods for a more well rounded view and opinion.
