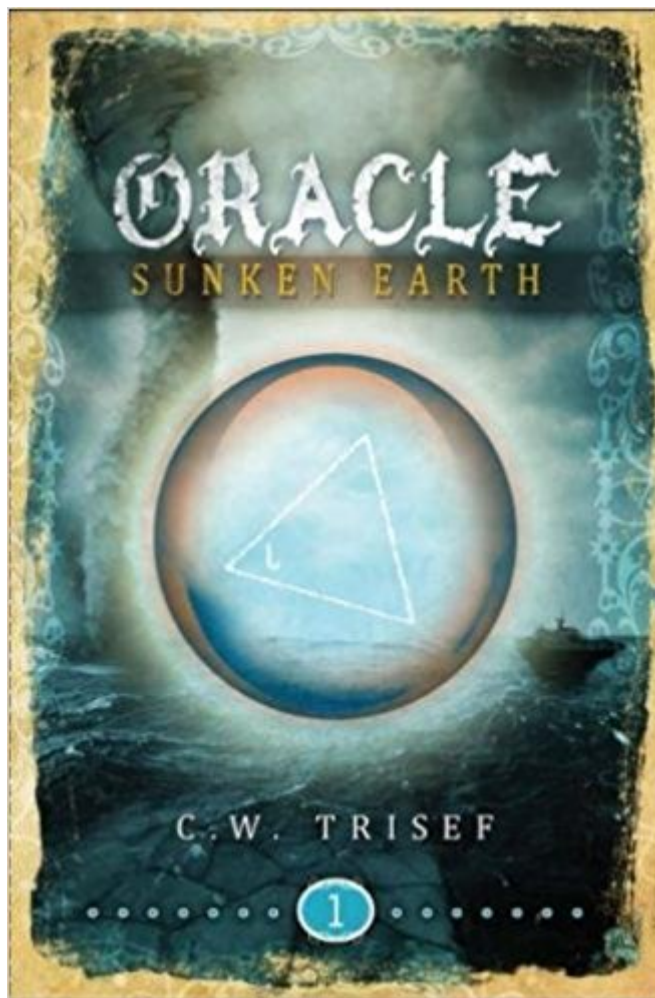

Stuck in a world of poverty, Ret feels uncomfortable with the surrounding wars between people. He finds an strange glass sphere, the Oracle. He learns that if filled with all of mother natures purest elements, he can "Cure the world". As he finds friends and family, he also discovers things about himself. With the help of friends and family Ret goes on a journey to find an underwater city completely divided into 2 different classes, useless scum, and rich power holders. Ret has to climb a mountain booming with electricity, fight a mighty war, and stop an evil, greedy and, centuries old villain, Lord Lye, in order to procure the first element. This fantastic book will keep you on the edge of your seats (or beds) until the end. I would highly recommend it to any adventure, mystery, or new book seekers.

I became very interested in this series when my grandson gave me the rundown of the series after he finished the first book. Understand that this is the first book that I am aware of him finishing. I'm a voracious reader but this 14 year old, not so much. Not only did he finish the book but he was able to articulate the message received of how important the earth's elements are to us and how much more carefully we need to guard and protect them. I have just finished the first book and I am hooked! The science fiction elements are very well written and are incredibly descriptive. The book manages to keep young adults involved but doesn't seem too trite for a well read adult. We are both looking forward to the 2nd book and I can't wait to discuss the message of the Oracle further with him.

I do not get around to reading too much fiction so this book was a nice change of pace! It was a recommended read so I went ahead and gave it a go. I thought the development was excellent and it actually was not too slow out of the gate relatively speaking. It starts off quick with a struggle, which gets tied together a few chapters after the intro. The author displayed a broad use of vocabulary, which I actually appreciated. Definitely some big words used in description that required I look up a definition or two but I can appreciate learning while reading. Like another reviewer, I felt that the "Ben-Coy's" got too be a bit much. I also expected Jaret to pop up in sucken earth but the fact that he didn't turned out to be more of surprise than if he had. Overall, it was a great adventure and a fun read! I will read the next one and would highly recommend parents pick this book up for their kids! This is the type of book that is very kid friendly with solid characters displaying noble qualities with a stimulating and creative story line!

I read this book off a recommendation from a friend. The plot was slow to start, but as is the nature of first books in a series. I felt the author used larger words that might require a dictionary to understand their meaning instead of more commonly used words thus slowing the flow of reading. The description of the house was confusing, and the development of Mr. Coy irritating (but I usually find at least one character in a book irritating.) I would like to see a calmer Mr. Coy in the future books. I do realize that he is eccentric, but some of the "ben-coy" got to be too much. The book was the time span of a school year, which took me by surprise. At one moment, it was the start of school, the next the winter formal, and before you know it, school is over. There was little between the winter formal and school ending. I think there should have been more development of the other characters like Quirk and Stone, but maybe that is planned for later books. I enjoyed the creativity in the book. The use of science is a great way to encourage our children to look beyond the everyday basics of life. The book left me wanting to read the next one to discover the next element and how Ret was to collect the element. It would be a nice turn of events if Jaret returned in one of the books. I was actually waiting for him to appear in the Sunken Earth world. I look forward to reading more of what this author has in store for these characters.

The author of this book came to my school to talk about the book. The presentation he gave was very interesting so I decided to try out the first one. I will definitely read the other ones and I recommend them. They are an easy read I read them in about 5 hours. I would recommend them for ages 8-14.

My middle school son loves the Oracle series! We discovered the series after 3 of the books had been released. Now he hates waiting for the next book in the series to come out! I love that he is so excited to see what happens next!

I liked that this book was clean. I can definitely recommend it without worrying that I might be causing offense--a fun read with an interesting storyline and some unique characters. I was a bit confused at the beginning, and felt like there were some holes in the plot and character development, but I felt that the end of the story was tighter with more to bind things together. This is definitely a good start--especially for a new author. I am excited to see what happens.

The story of the Oracle and the adventures surrounding it drew me in from the first page and held me through the last page. Free of excessive violence and obscene language, this book is a perfect

read for young adults and adults.
