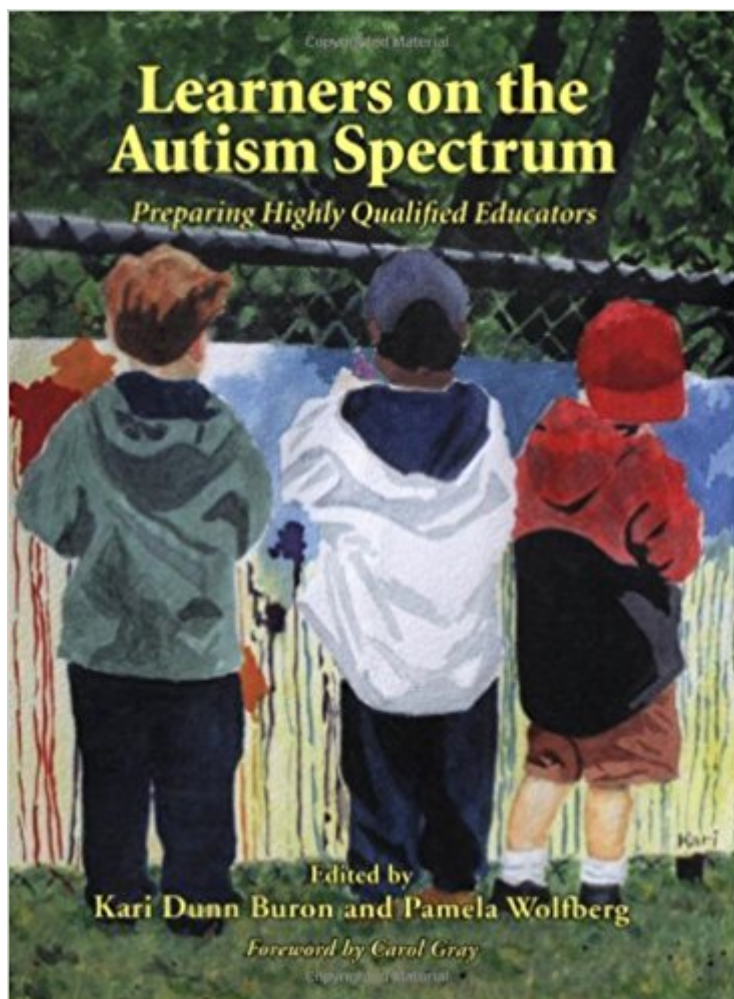

I am a special educator for students with ASD. I am always looking for informational books that I can recommend to my students' families. Typically I find that books on the topic are too introductory or too clinical--this one finds a solid middle ground. It offers a strong introduction to the overwhelming world of ASD and explains the topic in a way that can be easily understood. I came across this book in my Master's Degree program, as it is geared toward preparing teachers, but I also think it can be helpful to parents who are looking to learn more. I have read countless books on the topic of autism--this is probably the best I have found out there.
