

A Time Of Miracles



Synopsis

Political troubles and civil unrest force a woman and young boy to flee their war-torn country in search of a safe haven in this award-winning novel that speaks to issues that are both timely and universal. Blaise Fortune, also known as Kouma I, loves hearing the story of how he came to live with Gloria in the Republic of Georgia: Gloria ran to the site of a train accident where she found an injured woman who asked Gloria to take her baby. The woman, Gloria says, was French, and the baby was Blaise. When Blaise turns seven years old, the Soviet Union collapses, and it's then that Gloria decides she and Blaise must flee. They make their way westward on foot, heading toward France, where Gloria says they will find safe haven. During their five-year journey across the Caucasus and Europe as they encounter other refugees searching for a better life, Blaise grows from a boy into an adolescent. However, it's only as a young man can Blaise attempt to untangle his identity. Bondoux's heartbreakingly beautiful tribute to maternal love and the power of stories amid contemporary political chaos.

After the collapse of the Soviet Union, seven-year-old Kouma  and his guardian, Gloria, flee violent unrest and begin an arduous journey across the Caucasus toward France. That  where Kouma  was born, according to Gloria, who describes how she found Kouma  in the wreckage of a train accident that killed his French mother. Gloria became the boy  devoted guardian, and Kouma  recounts their inseparable bond as they risk everything, finding shelter in forests, camps, and gypsy settlements. Bondoux, author of the multi-award-winning *The Killer*  (2006), tells another unusual, wrenching story of a vulnerable child.

Kouma   first-person voice shifts uneasily between a young person  na  vet  and an adult  acquired wisdom:  "I  in a rush to grow up. I sense that the world in which we live is hostile to children."  That may be a natural combination in an individual who has endured so much so young, though, and in potent details, Bondoux creates indelible scenes of resilient children who, like Kouma  I, find strength in painful memories:  "To be less afraid of the darkness and the unknown, I call on my ghosts." KoumaÃƒÆ'Ã I is a young boy and when him and Gloria must flee he has to leave many things behind. As soon as he gets comfortable in one place they must again move on as the war follows at their heels. I really enjoyed following their journey across the continent. KoumaÃƒÆ'Ã I was a very interesting character and it was fascinating to hear his account of the trip that he had to make. Seeing everything from a child's point of view makes the whole situation look a whole lot different than if an adult was telling it. A child's perspective though not any lesser of an observation, is often times more naive, a young child simply doesn't know what is going on, often because the adults are trying to shield them from it. This is certainly the case in this novel. KoumaÃƒÆ'Ã I is much more worried about leaving his friends and hoping that Gloria is okay, than the war itself which they are fleeing. is a little 200+ page novel that packs quite a punch. Translated from French, this story is told as an extended flashback laced with intricate details and told in flowing prose. Originally, the synopsis failed to impress me, and I started this book with a feeling of dread, often reminding myself of the fact that I could simply write a scathing review to vent my feelings afterward. And Koumail, oh Koumail - funny, sweet, and fiercely protective of Gloria. It isn't possible for someone to not like this little boy. He entertains with his antics, his blind faith, and the three true loves he meets on their short journey.
