


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# We Are Not Afraid



## **Synopsis**

Today, fear affects even the strongest of us. Sometimes it's immediate, caused by a sense of imminent danger-the kind we felt after terrorists destroyed the magnificent World Trade Center, tore a giant wound in the Pentagon and killed thousands of people. Hickam's latest book is a little different from the other feel-good stories that emerged nationwide after the September 11 attacks. What sets his stories apart is where they all take place: the mining town of Coalwood, W.Va., the setting for his bestselling memoirs *Sky of Stone* and *October Sky*. In this inspirational guide to overcoming fear, Hickam shares anecdotes from his life, mainly having to do with the values he learned in the small, humble town of Coalwood. It's a different type of book than any of Hickam's Coalwood memoirs that everyone has come to love. It is more self-help based, and there are some good points in there. (even though I'm always a skeptic of these types of books) That being said, it is a lot of Hickam's ideologies, and long-winded hard-lined opinions about issues that aren't always black and white. He made a few statements that really made me think less of him as a person. I still think the guy is an American role model and great author, and I will continue to read his books. That being said, I got the vibe that this book was something pushed on him by his publishers as a potential money-maker in the immediate post-9/11 fervor. Save your money. If you haven't read *Rocket Boys*, *The Coalwood Way*, or *Sky of Stone*, I urge you to read those books instead! There are more life lessons within them and they are more well-written.

I'm a fan of Homer Hickam. I met him at a Mars Society convention. He was a guest speaker. A real down to earth man who likes people. I've bought and reviewed most of his books, All 4 or 5 stars. *We Are Not Afraid* was a good inspirational book on how to lead a good life using principles shown from Homer, his family and neighbors in Coalwood, a small town in the coal producing region of West Virginia. Homer was born in 1943 and went into the army in 1966. We see different people in Coalwood during this period giving their stories that gave them strength and understanding in their lives. Many inspirational stories showing how you don't have to be afraid living. We learn to stick up for ourselves and confront bullies and avoid lying. Stay away from negative people as they will bring your spirits down. Homer has a nice even flowing, descriptive writing style that is easy to read and makes the reader want to read on. *We Are Not Afraid* was a 242 page burner I read in one day. I couldn't put it down. We learn its good to believe in God and pray but we must take action in our lives. Get outside and meet people. Do charity work and recreation. Its OK to dream of a great occupation/job but you must go get it if its going to happen. We learn the 3 "P" system with

perseverance necessary. Don't give up and keep trying. We learn the value of an education and to stay in school and not be a quitter. We learn why it's so important to have friends. Also why marriage and the family are sacred and why both husband and wife must do everything for it to succeed. We are shown the USA is a great country with great people and to be proud of it. It took Homer till he was well into his thirties before he got his engineering job with NASA. He kept trying after rejections. Also it took years and years before he wrote his first "Best Seller" book. Lots more of helpful advice. I liked his Rocket Boys, Torpedo Junction, Lighthouse Keeper and son series, the Dinosaur Hunter and his 3 book Coalwood collection a little better ( all 5 stars). Also Rocket Boys was made into a great award winning, family viewing, movie "October Sky"... 5 stars. We Are Not Afraid 4 stars and proudly added to our Homer Hickam shelf in our family library.
