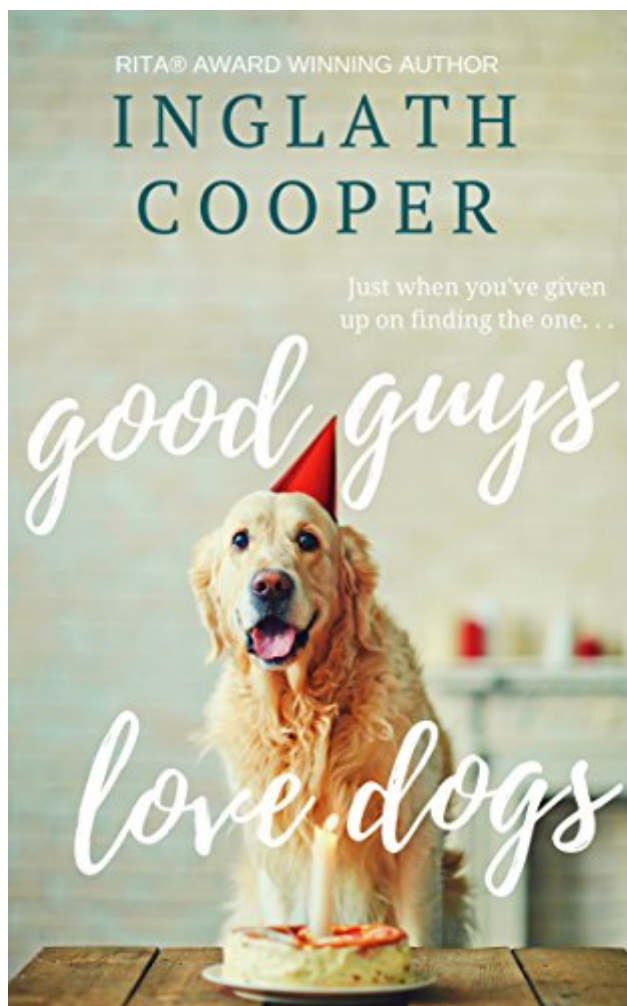

Living in the small town of Keeling, VA, Colby Williams, the only vet in town struggles with raising her teenage daughter, Lena who seems to have been overtaken by a defiant alien who's sullen and angry. Taking on parenthood as a single mother is painful when her once sweet and loving child has gone AWOL. Determined to remain single despite her meddlesome best friend, things heat-up when she meets city slicker Ian McKinley. Ian has moved to the small town from his job and fiancée for a year in hopes of reestablishing his connection with his wayward teenage son, Luke. After an awkward, blind date at her friends Phoebe and Frank's, their, try to ignore chemistry heats up leaving you laughing, crying, wringing your hands to cheering! I absolutely loved the personalities of her characters and the wonderful animals that enhanced the book with their vibrancy. I didn't want it to end!

This book is a sweet, pleasant read. A lite read that has a really good flow and I enjoyed both the writing and the story telling (sometimes you can have one without the other). Ian leaves NYC for a small town and sample living. While doing so, he realizes that he has a lot more in common with these country forks then he ever had with the big city life that he left behind. Colby, a single mother that has proven that she can make it on her own. When she mets Ian, sparks fly and she realizes her loneliness that she's been denying all these years.
