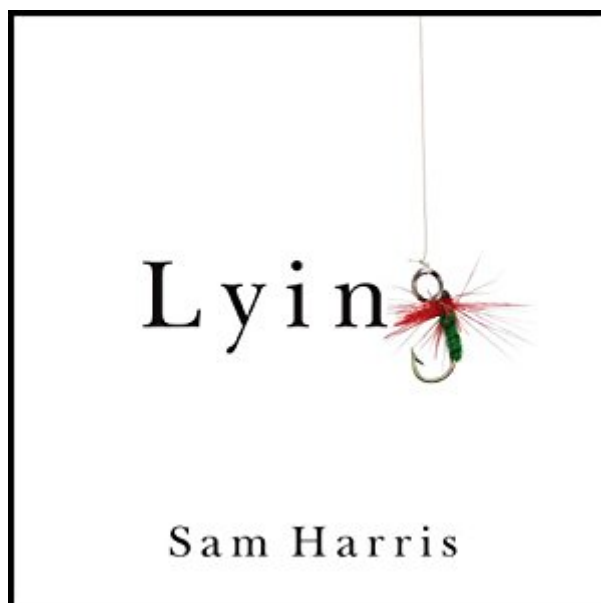

Acts of adultery and other personal betrayals, financial fraud, government corruption - even murder and genocide - generally require an additional moral defect: a willingness to lie. In Lying, bestselling author and neuroscientist Sam Harris argues that we can radically simplify our lives and improve society by merely telling the truth in situations where others often lie. He focuses on "white" lies - those lies we tell for the purpose of sparing people discomfort - for these are the lies that most often tempt us. And they tend to be the only lies that good people tell while imagining that they are being good in the process.

I was really interested in reading this book because while there are books on ethics in general it is beneficial to read about lying and the corrosive effects it can have on relationships. Before I read the book I was striving to be more honest and open in my relationship and this book helped give the why one should be more honest. A couple of things I would have like to see include a section on being honest with one's self. We tell ourselves lies like "I can quit smoking whenever I want." when we need to be more honest instead ("I need help quitting smoking."). The other thing I would have like is a section on how to get others to be more open and honest with the reader and discourage them from giving at least white lies. It takes a certain maturity to listen to and accept the truth from others but I don't think that this was touched on in the book. Rather, the book focused mainly on the reader being more honest to others.
