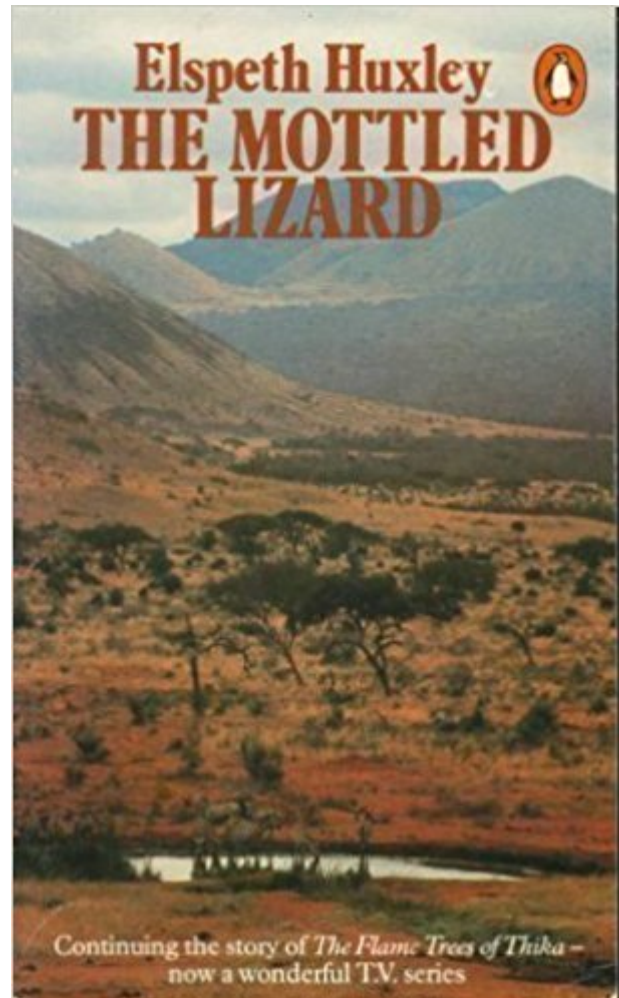

For their daughter, now 11, it is back to the ponies, lessons at home, wild pets (this time a cheetah named Rupert), and hunting trips with Njombo, the Kikuyu headman. But more is happening. The child narrator is growing into a woman. It describes not only life with her family, but also interactions with many more young settlers (read men), natives, and the changing relationships between them. And, of course, some of the stars are the wildlife of Africa. An excellent book, a really good read, and highly recommended.
